#### How To Win Popular Votes

- 1. Native Son or Daughter: Each candidate for President get two (2) popular votes in his/her home state. (Your group chooses the state.)
- 2. Campaign Events: Each candidate gets to choose three (3) states where they will have campaign events. The candidate will receive one popular vote in each of these states.
- 3. Advertising: Each candidate receives 10, 000,000 to spend of advertising in the states of their choosing. This can be spent in two ways:
  - a. A 1,000,000 of advertising in a specific state gets one popular vote in that state. (For example, \$3,000,000 in OH = 3 popular votes in OH.)
  - b. \$8,000,000 for a National Campaign gets one (1) votes in each state.
- 4. Issues: The candidate gets to choose three (3) issues, which will set the theme for your campaign. The issues you decide on can help you in some states, but hurt you in others. Please see the chart below.

## How To Win Popular Votes - Third Party

- 6. Campaign Events: Each candidate gets to choose two (2) states where they will have campaign events. The candidate will receive one popular vote in each of these states.
- 7. Advertising: Each candidate receives 4,000,000 to spend of advertising in the states of their choosing. A 1,000,000 of advertising in a specific state gets one popular vote in that state. (For example, \$3,000,000 in OH = 3 popular votes in OH.)
- 8. Issues: The candidate gets to choose one (1) issue, which will set the theme for your campaign. The issue you decide on can help you in some states, but hurt you in others. Please see the chart below.
